1.0 EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 Overview

At Available Healthcare Limited, we recognize that healthcare providers have a crucial role to play in addressing the global climate crisis. As a dedicated healthcare provider committed to high-quality care, we understand the direct connection between environmental health and human health. The impacts of climate change, including heat waves, flooding, and air pollution, are increasingly influencing Service User outcomes, especially for vulnerable groups like the elderly, those with respiratory conditions, and individuals with chronic illnesses.

Available Healthcare Limited is therefore dedicated to not only providing the best possible care but also safeguarding the future by reducing our environmental footprint. Through this Carbon Reduction Plan (CRP), Available Healthcare Limited is taking decisive steps toward reducing our greenhouse gas emissions, mitigating the impacts of climate change, and transitioning to a more sustainable healthcare model.

This commitment to carbon reduction aligns with both national and global climate action goals and underscores the importance of integrating sustainability into healthcare practices. Our actions are guided by a recognition that sustainability is not just about reducing emissions but also about creating a healthier, safer, and more resilient environment for the communities we serve.

As we work toward achieving these ambitious goals, we aim to not only meet regulatory standards but also become a model for other healthcare organizations in reducing carbon emissions. Through practical, actionable steps outlined in this plan, we will embed sustainability into our operations, processes, and care practices, ensuring that our healthcare services contribute positively to the environment while supporting the well-being of those in our care.

1.2 Objectives

Available Healthcare Limited's carbon reduction objectives are aligned with the UK's national climate policies, including the Net Zero Strategy and Climate Change Act 2008. These policies set out the country's commitment to reaching net-zero emissions by 2050, with binding targets to reduce carbon emissions at every level of society, from businesses to local communities.

To meet these ambitious goals and contribute to the UK's decarbonisation efforts, Available Healthcare Limited has developed a comprehensive Carbon Reduction Plan (CRP) that focuses on achieving both short-term and long-term targets. Our objectives include:

1. Achieve Net-Zero Emissions by 2050:

- As part of the UK's legally binding commitment under the Climate Change Act 2008, Available Healthcare Limited is committed to reducing our emissions to net-zero by 2050. This long-term goal is designed to help reduce the global temperature rise and mitigate the environmental impacts that climate change is having on healthcare delivery.
- We aim to implement long-term sustainable solutions that will contribute to decarbonizing our entire operations, from energy consumption to waste management, procurement, and transportation.

2. Immediate Short-Term Goals (Year 1–2):

- 10% reduction in carbon emissions within the first two years of implementing this plan.

- Adoption of renewable energy sources for 30% of our total energy consumption, including the transition to green electricity providers and on-site renewable energy generation such as solar panels.
- 15% reduction in waste to landfill by improving waste segregation, recycling, and reusing materials wherever possible.

3. Medium-Term Goals (Year 3–5):

- Achieve a 25% reduction in carbon emissions over the next 3 to 5 years by improving energy efficiency in our healthcare facilities, adopting low-carbon technologies, and promoting green transport.
- Ensure 50% of energy usage is derived from renewable sources, including energy-efficient heating, cooling, and lighting systems, in line with the UK's national climate strategy.
- Reduce operational waste by 30% through the implementation of more sustainable waste management practices and the adoption of circular economy principles.

4. Long-Term Goals (Year 6–10):

- Achieve 50% reduction in carbon emissions across Available Healthcare Limited.
- Move to 100% renewable energy across all facilities, ensuring all electricity, heating, and cooling systems are powered by green sources.
- Attain zero waste to landfill by 2030, ensuring that every product, resource, and material is either recycled, composted, or reused within Available Healthcare Limited's supply chain.

1.3 CQC Compliance: Meeting Environmental Management Standards and Healthcare Sector Obligations

As a healthcare provider, compliance with CQC regulations is essential to maintaining high standards of care and ensuring the safety and well-being of Service Users. The Care Quality Commission (CQC) is the regulatory body responsible for monitoring and assessing the quality of health and social care services in England. One of the core areas of focus for the CQC is ensuring that healthcare providers minimize their environmental impact and implement effective environmental management practices.

CQC's Key Lines of Enquiry (KLOE) for healthcare providers include assessing how well organizations manage their environmental responsibilities, including the effective management of energy use, waste, water, and the reduction of carbon emissions. Compliance with these regulations ensures that we meet the CQC's standards for sustainability while continuing to deliver high-quality care to our Service Users.

To meet CQC environmental standards, Available Healthcare Limited has integrated carbon reduction measures directly into our day-to-day operations and care practices. The following actions demonstrate our commitment to ensuring CQC compliance through our carbon reduction efforts:

- 1. Energy Management and Efficiency:** Available Healthcare Limited will implement energy-saving measures in all healthcare facilities, including upgrading to LED lighting, energy-efficient HVAC systems, and utilizing smart thermostats to control heating and cooling more effectively. These measures will reduce energy consumption,

lower emissions, and improve overall efficiency in line with CQC expectations for sustainable operational practices.

2. **Sustainable Waste Management:** Effective waste management is critical for minimizing environmental impact in healthcare. We will ensure compliance with CQC regulations on waste disposal by segregating and recycling waste, including clinical waste, paper, plastic, and e-waste. All waste management practices will be carried out in accordance with the Environmental Protection Act 1990 and other relevant healthcare waste regulations.

Our target is to reduce waste to landfill by 15% in the first two years and continue to improve recycling rates in subsequent years.

3. **Sustainable Procurement Practices:** To align with CQC's expectation for sustainable resource use, Available Healthcare Limited will adopt a sustainable procurement policy that ensures all products and services procured meet environmental standards. We will prioritize suppliers with green certifications (e.g., ISO 14001), encourage the use of recyclable materials, and reduce the carbon footprint of products and services within our supply chain.
4. **Reducing Environmental Impacts of Transportation:** Our carbon reduction strategy also includes reducing emissions from our fleet of vehicles used to transport Service Users and deliver supplies. We will explore electric vehicle options and reduce fuel consumption through optimized scheduling, which will directly contribute to CQC's standards for sustainable practices in healthcare services.
5. **Staff Engagement and Training:** Available Healthcare Limited recognizes the importance of engaging staff in sustainability efforts. Through staff training programs, we will educate our employees about the significance of reducing environmental impacts and how they can contribute to achieving our carbon reduction goals. This will ensure that all staff members understand their role in meeting the CQC's environmental sustainability requirements and integrating carbon-reduction practices into their daily routines.
6. **Regular Audits and Reporting:** To maintain CQC compliance, we will conduct regular environmental audits to assess the effectiveness of our carbon reduction initiatives and ensure adherence to regulations. Progress will be reported transparently to the CQC and other regulatory bodies, demonstrating our commitment to continual improvement and accountability in our environmental practices.

2.0 ORGANIZATIONAL COMMITMENT TO CARBON REDUCTION

2.1 Leadership and Governance

Senior Leadership's Role in Ensuring the CRP's Implementation

At Available Healthcare Limited, the commitment to carbon reduction begins at the top, with senior leadership playing a critical role in ensuring the successful implementation of the Carbon Reduction Plan (CRP). The senior leadership team is responsible for setting the overall direction for sustainability efforts within Available Healthcare Limited, ensuring alignment with both national climate goals and regulatory requirements.

The Chief Executive Officer (CEO) and Board of Directors will be accountable for ensuring that the CRP is integrated into Available Healthcare Limited's overall strategy and decision-making processes. They will provide the necessary resources, budget, and support for carbon reduction initiatives. Senior leaders will also act as key advocates for sustainability, promoting the plan both internally and externally to stakeholders, employees, Service Users, and the community.

The CEO and Board will oversee the following:

- **Governance and Accountability:** They will ensure that sustainability and carbon reduction goals are part of Available Healthcare Limited's long-term vision. They will monitor and review the performance of the CRP regularly and hold departments accountable for achieving carbon reduction targets.
- **Strategic Oversight:** Senior leadership will guide Available Healthcare Limited in achieving the carbon reduction objectives, ensuring that policies and actions align with government strategies such as the Net Zero Strategy and comply with regulatory requirements set by CQC and BEIS.
- **Resource Allocation:** The leadership team will allocate necessary resources (financial, technological, and human) for the successful implementation of carbon reduction initiatives across Available Healthcare Limited. This includes supporting the acquisition of renewable energy solutions, energy-efficient technologies, and sustainable waste management practices.

Roles and Responsibilities of Internal Teams or Officers Assigned to Carbon Reduction Efforts

In addition to senior leadership, it is essential to have dedicated internal teams or officers who are responsible for the day-to-day management of the CRP. This will ensure that the plan is executed effectively across all levels of Available Healthcare Limited. Key roles include:

1. **Carbon Reduction Officer (CRO):** The CRO will be responsible for the overall execution of the CRP, overseeing the carbon reduction strategies and ensuring that each department adheres to the targets and objectives set out in the plan. The CRO will report directly to the senior leadership team and provide regular updates on progress, challenges, and opportunities.
2. **Sustainability Taskforce:** A cross-departmental team will be established to support the CRO. This taskforce will consist of representatives from key departments, including healthcare services, facilities management, procurement, waste management, and IT. The team will work collaboratively to:
 - Develop and implement department-specific action plans.
 - Monitor progress against targets.
 - Conduct periodic assessments and audits to identify areas for improvement.
 - Ensure the integration of sustainability principles into daily operations.
3. **Facilities and Operations Team:** This team will be responsible for implementing energy efficiency measures, managing waste reduction and recycling, and ensuring that sustainable practices are followed in building operations, including heating, lighting, and ventilation systems.
4. **Procurement Team:** The procurement team will play a vital role in ensuring that all purchasing decisions, including medical supplies, office equipment, and services, align

with sustainability goals. This includes sourcing products from suppliers with green certifications and prioritizing sustainable materials.

5. **Staff and Training Officers:** It will be important for all employees to be trained in sustainability practices, especially in how their roles impact the carbon footprint of Available Healthcare Limited. Staff engagement will be managed by the training officers who will be responsible for organizing educational initiatives, workshops, and awareness campaigns focused on energy efficiency, waste management, and sustainable practices.

2.2 Policies and Frameworks

Alignment with BEIS and CQC Regulations and Policies

The CRP will be guided by the regulatory frameworks set out by BEIS (Department for Business, Energy & Industrial Strategy), CQC, and other national sustainability policies. Ensuring alignment with these standards will be a critical component of the plan's success. Specifically, our carbon reduction efforts will be designed to meet the following requirements:

1. **BEIS Policies:** The Department for Business, Energy & Industrial Strategy (BEIS) sets out the strategic direction for the UK's energy policy and carbon reduction targets. As such, our CRP will align with the Net Zero Strategy (published in 2020) and the Clean Growth Strategy, both of which outline the government's approach to decarbonizing energy systems, improving energy efficiency, and transitioning to a low-carbon economy.
 - We will adopt energy-saving initiatives, renewable energy solutions, and energy-efficient technologies as prescribed by BEIS guidelines, focusing on reducing our operational carbon footprint and complying with national emissions reduction targets.
 - Available Healthcare Limited will also engage in initiatives that support BEIS carbon budgets, ensuring that our emission reduction efforts align with legally mandated reductions over five-year periods.
2. **CQC Regulations:** The Care Quality Commission (CQC) is the regulatory body that oversees healthcare providers in England, ensuring that services are safe, effective, and environmentally sustainable. CQC regulations, specifically Regulation 16 (Assessment of Need for Care and Treatment) and Regulation 17 (Good Governance), require healthcare organizations to ensure that environmental sustainability is integrated into service delivery.
 - Regulation 16 emphasizes the importance of assessing the environmental impact of care delivery, which means that we must take into account energy consumption, waste generation, and other environmental factors when designing care plans for Service Users.
 - Regulation 17 focuses on governance and management systems. This regulation mandates that organizations demonstrate good governance, including the development and implementation of policies related to sustainability. The CRP aligns with Regulation 17 by ensuring that carbon reduction efforts are built into our governance structures, with clear oversight and accountability mechanisms in place.
3. **Waste Management and Sustainable Procurement:** To comply with BEIS guidelines and CQC regulations, Available Healthcare Limited will develop and implement robust

energy efficiency measures, waste management strategies, and sustainable procurement practices:

- Energy Efficiency: We will implement energy-saving initiatives, such as the use of energy-efficient lighting and appliances, and encourage the use of low-carbon technologies across all operations.
- Waste Management: Our waste management policy will be aligned with both national regulations and best practices in environmental stewardship. We will ensure that we comply with CQC guidelines on waste disposal, which includes the safe handling and disposal of medical and non-medical waste, recycling, and minimizing waste sent to landfills.
- Sustainable Procurement: The procurement policy will prioritize suppliers that demonstrate a commitment to sustainability. This includes sourcing products with lower environmental footprints and prioritizing recyclable and biodegradable materials. We will also encourage our suppliers to adopt carbon reduction practices in their own operations.

3.0 CARBON EMISSIONS BASELINE AND MEASUREMENT

3.1 Current Emissions Inventory

To effectively reduce carbon emissions, it is essential to first understand the current state of emissions across Available Healthcare Limited. Establishing a carbon emissions baseline provides a reference point from which progress can be measured. This baseline will allow Available Healthcare Limited to assess where emissions are coming from and identify areas with the most significant potential for reduction.

Establishing the Baseline: Calculating Current Carbon Footprint

We will calculate our current carbon footprint by identifying and quantifying emissions across the three different scopes outlined by the Greenhouse Gas Protocol:

1. Scope 1: Direct Emissions: These are emissions that occur directly from sources owned or controlled by Available Healthcare Limited. Examples include:
 - Fuel consumption in company-owned vehicles used for Service User transport and logistics.
 - Natural gas usage for heating in healthcare facilities.

- On-site electricity generation (if applicable).

The carbon emissions from these activities will be calculated based on the amount of fuel or energy consumed, using appropriate emissions factors (such as those provided by Defra's GHG Conversion Factors and The Environment Agency (EA)).

2. **Scope 2: Indirect Emissions from Purchased Electricity:** These emissions occur as a result of Available Healthcare Limited's consumption of electricity, steam, heating, and cooling purchased from external suppliers. While Available Healthcare Limited does not control the emissions from electricity generation, we are still responsible for the carbon footprint associated with the energy we use.

To calculate Scope 2 emissions, we will gather data from energy bills for electricity, heating, and cooling services across our facilities. We will use emissions factors provided by the EA and BEIS to calculate the carbon emissions associated with this energy consumption.

3. **Scope 3: Other Indirect Emissions:** Scope 3 emissions are a result of activities from assets not owned or directly controlled by Available Healthcare Limited but that Available Healthcare Limited's activities indirectly impact. These include a wide range of activities, such as:

- Employee commuting (e.g., travel by car, public transport, or cycling).
- Waste disposal and recycling.
- Procurement of goods and services (e.g., medical supplies, office supplies, and cleaning products).
- Business travel (e.g., flights, hotel stays).

Calculating Scope 3 emissions can be complex, but Available Healthcare Limited will work with suppliers and gather data from internal sources to estimate the total emissions from these activities. We will prioritize Scope 3 categories that are most relevant to our operations and have the highest potential for emissions reductions.

Utilizing Data from the Environment Agency (EA) and Other Relevant Bodies

We will leverage data from reliable sources such as the EA, BEIS, and other relevant industry bodies to benchmark and validate our emissions calculations. These organizations provide emission factors, guidelines, and sector-specific data that will help us to accurately calculate emissions across all three scopes. This data will be used to benchmark our performance against industry standards and national carbon reduction targets.

3.2 Measurement Methodology

To ensure that our carbon footprint is accurately measured, we will adhere to recognized standards and methodologies. Our approach to measuring and reporting carbon emissions will follow best practices to ensure transparency, consistency, and accuracy.

Measuring and Reporting Carbon Emissions

1. Tools and Standards:

- **Greenhouse Gas Protocol:** We will use the Greenhouse Gas (GHG) Protocol as the primary standard for calculating and reporting our emissions. The GHG Protocol divides emissions into the three categories of Scope 1, Scope 2, and Scope 3, and provides detailed guidance on how to calculate each. We will ensure that we follow all steps outlined in the protocol, from data collection to emission factor application.

- ISO 14064: We will also use ISO 14064 standards for the quantification and reporting of greenhouse gas emissions. This certification provides specific guidelines for developing a GHG inventory, including verification processes and quality assurance protocols to ensure accurate and reliable reporting.
 - BEIS and DEFRA Emissions Factors: The UK Department for Business, Energy & Industrial Strategy (BEIS) and Defra provide emissions factors for different activities such as energy consumption, transportation, and waste management. These factors will be applied when calculating emissions from electricity consumption, fuel use, and other activities to ensure consistency and accuracy.
2. **Carbon Trust Guidelines:** The Carbon Trust provides expert guidance on carbon footprint analysis, and we will follow their carbon footprinting methodology to assess our organizational emissions. The Carbon Trust's guidelines align with the GHG Protocol and ISO 14064, ensuring that our calculations meet international standards.

The Carbon Trust's guidelines will help us in:

- Identifying key emission sources: The Carbon Trust provides a clear framework to identify the key sources of carbon emissions, enabling us to focus on high-impact areas.
 - Calculating and reporting emissions: We will use the guidelines to calculate and report emissions accurately, ensuring transparency and consistency in our reporting.
 - Carbon footprint reduction: The Carbon Trust's advice will also guide our efforts to reduce emissions, focusing on low-hanging fruit and identifying the most effective carbon-saving initiatives.
3. **UK Government Greenhouse Gas Reporting Guidelines:** Available Healthcare Limited will also adhere to the UK Government Greenhouse Gas Reporting Guidelines. These guidelines are specifically designed for organizations operating in the UK and provide a structured approach to carbon footprint reporting. The guidelines cover:
- Scope 1, 2, and 3 emissions: The government's guidelines ensure that we correctly categorize emissions and report them in line with legal requirements.
 - Calculating GHG emissions: The guidelines provide clear instructions on the methods for calculating emissions and the tools and factors to use.
 - Annual reporting: The guidelines include a recommendation for organizations to report on their carbon emissions annually, providing transparency and public accountability.

Baseline Emissions Footprint

To establish our baseline emissions, we will calculate the total carbon emissions for each scope (Scope 1, Scope 2, and Scope 3) for the baseline year. The baseline year will typically be the first full year of data collection, serving as the reference point for tracking reductions over time.

The baseline emissions will be calculated using the following approach:

1. **Scope 1 (Direct emissions):**
 - Gather data on all direct energy and fuel consumption across all facilities and transportation activities.

- Apply appropriate emissions factors for each type of energy and fuel used.
- 2. Scope 2 (Indirect emissions from purchased electricity):**
 - Collect data on electricity and heating consumption from utility bills.
 - Apply the appropriate emissions factors for electricity consumption as provided by BEIS and DEFRA.
- 3. Scope 3 (Other indirect emissions):**
 - Collect data from suppliers and internal records to estimate emissions from activities such as employee commuting, waste disposal, and business travel.
 - Use relevant emissions factors for each category based on guidance from the Greenhouse Gas Protocol and Carbon Trust.

Once these emissions are calculated, we will compile the results in a carbon emissions report, which will detail:

- Total emissions for Scope 1, 2, and 3.
- The methodology used for calculation and the data sources.
- A breakdown of emissions by source and department, where applicable.

Additional Details Relating to Baseline Emissions Calculations

The baseline year emissions will serve as a reference for future comparisons. It will help identify key areas where emissions reductions can be made and will allow us to track progress over time. The baseline year emissions calculation will be comprehensive, transparent, and based on the most accurate data available. We will seek external verification of our baseline emissions to ensure credibility.

4.0 CARBON REDUCTION STRATEGIES AND ACTION PLAN

4.1 Actions and Initiatives

In order to achieve our carbon reduction targets and support the UK's Net Zero Strategy, Available Healthcare Limited will implement a series of concrete actions and initiatives designed to reduce energy consumption, incorporate renewable energy sources, invest in low-carbon technologies, and promote sustainable procurement. These initiatives will be based on national guidelines and sector-specific recommendations to ensure their effectiveness.

Energy Efficiency: Implement Strategies for Energy Use Reduction

As a key priority in our carbon reduction plan, energy efficiency will focus on minimizing the amount of energy consumed across all operations, while still maintaining the high standards of care that Available Healthcare Limited provides. We will implement energy-saving initiatives based on recommendations from National Grid ESO and Ofgem.

1. Building Energy Management:

- Upgrading Lighting: Replace all lighting with energy-efficient LED lighting, which uses less power and has a longer lifespan than traditional lighting systems.

- HVAC Systems: Upgrade heating, ventilation, and air conditioning (HVAC) systems to energy-efficient models. Install smart thermostats and sensors to optimize energy use based on occupancy and time of day.
- Insulation and Windows: Invest in better insulation for buildings and energy-efficient windows to minimize heat loss and reduce heating energy consumption.

2. Energy Monitoring and Management:

- Smart Meters and Sensors: Install smart meters to track and manage energy consumption more efficiently. These meters will allow real-time monitoring of energy use across various facilities.
- Data-Driven Energy Management: Utilize energy management software to analyse energy consumption patterns, identify inefficiencies, and optimize energy usage.

3. Operational Efficiency:

- Employee Behaviour Change: Implement employee training and awareness campaigns on energy conservation practices, including turning off unused equipment, minimizing heating or cooling during non-peak hours, and using power-saving modes for devices.

By following National Grid ESO and Ofgem recommendations, Available Healthcare Limited aims to reduce overall energy consumption by 20% over the next five years.

Renewable Energy: Integrate Renewable Energy Sources

Transitioning to renewable energy is a fundamental part of Available Healthcare Limited's carbon reduction strategy. We will integrate renewable energy sources, such as solar and wind power, into our operations to reduce reliance on fossil fuels and lower emissions from energy generation.

1. Solar Panels:

- Install Solar Panels: Where feasible, install solar panels on the roofs of our healthcare facilities to generate renewable energy. This will help to reduce our reliance on the national grid and lower Scope 2 emissions associated with purchased electricity.
- Energy Storage: Install energy storage systems (e.g., batteries) to store excess solar power for use during periods of high demand or low sunlight, further reducing our reliance on grid power.

2. Wind Power:

- Partnerships for Wind Energy: Collaborate with renewable energy providers to purchase wind power through green energy tariffs, or invest in local wind energy projects that allow us to source clean, renewable electricity for our facilities.

3. Green Energy Tariffs:

- Switch to 100% Renewable Energy Suppliers: Transition to energy suppliers that provide electricity generated solely from renewable sources, such as wind, solar, and hydroelectric power.

By integrating these renewable energy sources into our operations, we aim to have 50% of our total energy consumption coming from renewable sources within the next five years.

Low Carbon Technologies: Invest in Low-Carbon Technologies and Energy-Efficient Solutions

Investing in low-carbon technologies and energy-efficient solutions will play a critical role in reducing emissions from our operations. We will adopt the latest innovations in energy-saving technologies, aligning with the guidance of BEIS and the Green Finance Institute.

1. Energy-Efficient Appliances:

- Replace all old, inefficient appliances with energy-efficient models, such as Energy Star-rated medical equipment, LED lighting, energy-efficient refrigerators, and low-power computing devices.

2. Electric Vehicles (EVs):

- Transition to Electric Fleets: Where feasible, transition our vehicle fleet to electric vehicles (EVs) or low-emission hybrid vehicles for Service User transport and service-related travel. EVs offer significant reductions in Scope 1 emissions from transportation.
- EV Charging Stations: Install electric vehicle charging stations at our healthcare facilities to support the use of EVs among employees and visitors.

3. Building Automation Systems (BAS):

- Invest in Building Automation Systems (BAS) that allow for more efficient control of heating, cooling, lighting, and ventilation systems based on real-time occupancy and environmental conditions. This will enhance energy efficiency and reduce overall emissions from facilities.

These technologies will be integrated into our operations, with a goal of reducing our overall carbon emissions by 30% over the next five years.

Sustainable Procurement: Ensure that All Supply Chain Decisions and Procurement Policies Consider Carbon Impacts

Sustainable procurement will be a cornerstone of Available Healthcare Limited' carbon reduction plan. We will work to ensure that our supply chain decisions take into account the carbon impact of the products and services we purchase, in alignment with PPN 06/21 and other regulatory policies.

1. Green Procurement Policies:

- Establish Sustainability Criteria: Develop procurement policies that include sustainability criteria, prioritizing suppliers that demonstrate strong environmental practices, such as carbon-neutral certifications, sustainable materials, and low-carbon manufacturing processes.
- Supplier Engagement: Engage with key suppliers to promote carbon reduction initiatives within their own operations. Work with suppliers to identify opportunities for reducing emissions in the supply chain, including transport logistics, packaging, and product sourcing.

2. Low-Carbon Medical Supplies:

- Eco-Friendly Medical Products: Prioritize the procurement of eco-friendly medical supplies, such as biodegradable packaging, non-toxic cleaning materials, and sustainable disposables.
- Energy-Efficient Equipment: Purchase energy-efficient medical devices and equipment to reduce long-term energy consumption and associated emissions.

By adopting sustainable procurement policies, we aim to reduce Scope 3 emissions by 20% over the next five years.

4.2 Timeline for Implementation

To ensure the successful implementation of our carbon reduction strategies, we will establish clear timelines and milestones for each phase of the plan. This will include short-term, medium-term, and long-term goals, each with specific targets for reducing carbon emissions.

1. Short-Term Goals (Year 1–2):

- Energy Efficiency: Complete the implementation of energy-saving lighting and HVAC upgrades.
- Renewable Energy: Transition 30% of energy consumption to renewable energy sources, including the installation of solar panels in selected facilities.
- Low-Carbon Technologies: Transition 10% of our vehicle fleet to electric vehicles and begin purchasing low-carbon medical equipment.
- Sustainable Procurement: Implement a sustainable procurement policy and begin purchasing energy-efficient equipment and eco-friendly medical supplies.

2. Medium-Term Goals (Year 3–5):

- Energy Efficiency: Achieve a 20% reduction in overall energy consumption through ongoing improvements.
- Renewable Energy: Increase the share of renewable energy to 50% of total energy consumption.
- Low-Carbon Technologies: Transition 50% of our vehicle fleet to electric or hybrid vehicles.
- Sustainable Procurement: Engage with suppliers to ensure 50% of our procurement aligns with sustainable practices.

3. Long-Term Goals (Year 6–10):

- Energy Efficiency: Achieve a 30% reduction in energy consumption across all facilities.
- Renewable Energy: Ensure 100% of our energy comes from renewable sources.
- Low-Carbon Technologies: Fully transition to an electric fleet and continue to invest in energy-efficient technologies.
- Sustainable Procurement: Ensure that 100% of our procurement meets sustainability criteria.

4.3 Stakeholder Engagement

Engaging key stakeholders in the implementation of our carbon reduction plan is essential to its success. We will work collaboratively with various stakeholders, including suppliers, contractors, employees, and Service Users, to ensure that sustainability is integrated into every aspect of our operations.

1. Suppliers and Contractors:

- Supplier Collaboration: Engage with our suppliers and contractors to encourage them to reduce their carbon emissions. This may include setting targets for suppliers to reduce their own emissions and ensuring that they meet sustainability criteria in their operations.
- Sustainability Partnerships: Work with organizations like the UK Green Building Council (UKGBC) to collaborate on strategies for reducing carbon emissions in the built environment, ensuring that our facilities are as energy-efficient as possible.

2. Employees:

- Training and Awareness: Provide training programs to all employees on the importance of sustainability and how they can contribute to reducing emissions in their daily tasks. This includes promoting energy-saving behaviours and encouraging sustainable travel options for commuting.
- Employee Engagement: Create internal sustainability campaigns to encourage employees to be ambassadors for carbon reduction initiatives within Available Healthcare Limited.

3. Service Users and the Wider Community:

- Service User Education: Engage Service Users in sustainability efforts by providing information on the importance of reducing carbon emissions and how healthcare providers like Available Healthcare Limited are taking action.
- Community Initiatives: Partner with local community groups to promote sustainability in the healthcare sector and share best practices for reducing environmental impacts.

5.0 EMISSION REDUCTION TARGETS

5.1 Alignment with National Targets

As part of the UK's commitment to combating climate change, the government has set ambitious national targets for carbon emissions reductions, with the ultimate goal of achieving net-zero emissions by 2050 as per the Climate Change Act 2008. Available Healthcare Limited is fully aligned with these national targets and will contribute to achieving them by committing to reduce our carbon footprint in line with the UK's legally binding carbon budgets and emissions reduction pathways.

Commitment to Net Zero by 2050: The Climate Change Act 2008 sets out the UK's legal framework for reducing greenhouse gas emissions to net-zero by 2050. This legally binding commitment requires all sectors of society to contribute to emissions reductions, including healthcare organizations like Available Healthcare Limited. By reducing our carbon emissions, Available Healthcare Limited will directly contribute to the UK's overarching goal of achieving net-zero emissions.

Interim Carbon Reduction Targets (Carbon Budgets): To ensure that the journey toward net-zero by 2050 is achievable, the Climate Change Committee (CCC) has developed a series of carbon budgets. These budgets are set for five-year periods, outlining the emissions reductions required from each sector to meet the long-term net-zero target.

Available Healthcare Limited will align its emission reduction strategy with these carbon budgets by adopting interim targets for emissions reductions over specific periods, as follows:

1. **Short-Term Target (Year 1–2):** Reduce emissions by 10% within the first two years. This will help establish the foundation for deeper cuts in the future by focusing on energy efficiency measures and renewable energy adoption.
2. **Medium-Term Target (Year 3–5):** Achieve a 25% reduction in emissions by the end of Year 5, focusing on larger-scale initiatives such as transitioning to renewable energy sources, enhancing waste management practices, and incorporating low-carbon technologies in operations.
3. **Long-Term Target (Year 6–10):** Achieve a 50% reduction in emissions over the next 6–10 years. This will be achieved through the continued adoption of low-carbon technologies, electric vehicle fleets, energy-efficient infrastructure, and a focus on sustainable procurement.
4. **Net-Zero by 2050:** Achieve net-zero emissions by 2050, in line with the UK government's Climate Change Act 2008. This will involve ongoing, incremental reductions across all scopes (Scope 1, Scope 2, and Scope 3) and achieving full decarbonisation of our operations, including zero carbon emissions from energy, waste, and transportation by 2050.

5.2 CQC Regulations Compliance

CQC's Environmental Standards and Expectations: The Care Quality Commission (CQC) plays a key role in ensuring that healthcare organizations in England meet high standards of care, safety, and efficiency. One of the CQC's key lines of enquiry (KLOE) involves assessing how organizations manage their environmental impact, which includes energy usage, waste management, and carbon emissions.

The CQC expects healthcare providers to:

- Minimize their carbon footprint by implementing energy-efficient solutions and renewable energy strategies.
- Ensure that sustainability is embedded in governance structures and service delivery.
- Monitor and reduce the environmental impact of operations, ensuring that carbon emissions are carefully managed and minimized.

In line with CQC's Regulation 16 (Assessment of Need for Care and Treatment) and Regulation 17 (Good Governance), Available Healthcare Limited will ensure that our emission reduction targets are aligned with these regulatory standards, focusing on reducing the carbon impacts of healthcare operations. Specifically, our targets will focus on:

1. **Energy Consumption and Efficiency:** The CQC emphasizes the need for healthcare organizations to manage their energy consumption effectively. Available Healthcare Limited will achieve a 20% reduction in energy consumption within the first 5 years, through strategies such as upgrading to energy-efficient lighting, HVAC systems, and utilizing renewable energy sources.

Available Healthcare Limited will implement energy-saving behaviours across our facilities, with clear metrics and reporting structures to track energy usage and ensure efficiency. This will be part of our ongoing efforts to comply with CQC standards, which mandate the reduction of unnecessary energy consumption and carbon emissions.

2. **Sustainable Waste Management:** CQC regulations require healthcare organizations to reduce their environmental impact through effective waste management strategies. Available Healthcare Limited will aim to reduce waste to landfill by 15% in the first two years, focusing on enhancing recycling and reusing materials, as well as managing clinical and non-clinical waste more efficiently.

This reduction will be part of our wider sustainability strategy to meet CQC requirements for environmental sustainability and reduce carbon emissions associated with waste disposal.

3. **Sustainable Procurement:** The CQC encourages healthcare providers to incorporate sustainable procurement practices into their operations. Available Healthcare Limited will ensure that all supply chain decisions are based on environmental sustainability criteria, with a focus on purchasing low-carbon products, energy-efficient equipment, and sustainably sourced materials.

This aligns with CQC Regulation 17, which requires that governance and decision-making systems promote efficiency and sustainability. By adopting sustainable procurement policies, Available Healthcare Limited will minimize carbon emissions across its supply chain and meet CQC's environmental expectations.

4. **Regular Environmental Audits and Reporting:** The CQC expects healthcare providers to monitor and assess their environmental performance regularly. Available Healthcare Limited will conduct annual carbon emissions audits to assess progress toward our reduction targets and ensure compliance with CQC regulations.

These audits will be shared with senior leadership and reported to relevant stakeholders, including the CQC, to demonstrate accountability and transparency in our carbon reduction efforts.

6.0 MONITORING AND REPORTING

6.1 Carbon Monitoring Systems

Monitoring carbon emissions is crucial to effectively manage and reduce the environmental impact of our operations. Available Healthcare Limited will implement robust carbon monitoring systems that align with best practices and regulatory guidelines, ensuring that we can track emissions accurately, identify areas for improvement, and demonstrate progress in meeting our carbon reduction targets.

Continuous Monitoring of Carbon Emissions: To ensure effective monitoring of our carbon emissions, Available Healthcare Limited will deploy a combination of real-time monitoring technologies and manual data collection processes across all three scopes of emissions (Scope 1, Scope 2, and Scope 3). This will allow us to track energy use, waste generation, and transportation emissions, as well as other factors contributing to our carbon footprint.

1. **Real-Time Energy Monitoring Systems:** Smart Meters: Install smart meters at all facilities to monitor energy consumption in real-time. These meters will provide granular data on electricity and gas usage, allowing us to identify patterns of inefficiency or periods of high energy consumption.

Energy Management Software: Utilize energy management software that integrates data from smart meters to provide ongoing analysis of energy usage, identify trends, and flag anomalies in real-time. This software will also calculate carbon emissions from energy consumption and provide detailed insights on how energy is used across Available Healthcare Limited.

2. **Building Automation Systems (BAS):** We will use Building Automation Systems (BAS) to optimize energy use in real time. BAS allows Available Healthcare Limited to control lighting, HVAC systems, and other building operations based on occupancy, external weather conditions, and energy demand. This system will help reduce energy waste and improve overall energy efficiency.
3. **Transportation Emissions Monitoring:** Fleet Management Systems: We will track emissions from our vehicle fleet by using fleet management software, which monitors the fuel consumption, vehicle usage patterns, and emissions levels of our fleet. This system will allow us to track and optimize vehicle routes and fuel usage, reducing emissions from transportation.

Telematics: In addition, we will install telematics devices in company vehicles, which will provide data on driving behaviours such as speed, idling time, and fuel efficiency. This data will be used to reduce fuel consumption and emissions.

4. **Waste and Supply Chain Emissions:** Waste Management System: Implement a comprehensive waste management system that tracks waste generation, disposal methods, and recycling rates. This system will ensure that we can accurately calculate the carbon emissions associated with waste disposal and identify areas for improvement in recycling and waste reduction efforts.

Procurement Tracking: Develop a supplier tracking system to assess the carbon footprint of products and services purchased across our supply chain. This will allow us to measure and monitor Scope 3 emissions and ensure that we are meeting our sustainable procurement goals.

Frequency of Emissions Audits and Reporting:

Available Healthcare Limited will conduct regular audits and assessments to track our carbon emissions and measure progress toward our reduction targets. These audits will be aligned with industry standards and regulatory requirements, ensuring transparency and accountability in our carbon reduction efforts.

1. **Annual Emissions Audits:**

Internal Emissions Audits: We will perform annual internal emissions audits to assess our progress in reducing carbon emissions. These audits will be based on data collected throughout the year, including energy usage, fuel consumption, waste management, and procurement records.

External Verification: To ensure the accuracy and credibility of our emissions data, we will engage third-party auditors to verify our carbon emissions and reduction claims annually. This external verification will provide an independent assessment of our

progress and ensure compliance with global standards such as ISO 14064 and the Greenhouse Gas Protocol.

2. Reporting to Regulatory Bodies:

CQC Reporting Requirements: As required by CQC, we will report our environmental performance and carbon emissions reduction progress as part of our annual regulatory compliance reviews. This will include detailing our energy efficiency measures, waste reduction efforts, and other environmental initiatives that contribute to sustainability and carbon reduction.

Climate Change Committee (CCC): Available Healthcare Limited will submit an annual report to the Climate Change Committee (CCC), providing detailed updates on our carbon emissions reduction efforts. This report will include our emissions data for the year, progress toward meeting interim carbon reduction targets, and plans for the coming year. The report will be in line with the CCC's recommendations for carbon reporting and will demonstrate our commitment to meeting national climate targets.

6.2 Transparency and Accountability

Providing Transparent Reporting of Emissions Reductions and Progress: Transparency is a key element of our carbon reduction strategy. Available Healthcare Limited recognizes that providing stakeholders both internal and external with clear, honest, and accurate information on our emissions reductions is essential for maintaining trust and accountability.

1. Annual Sustainability Reports:

- Available Healthcare Limited will publish an annual sustainability report detailing our carbon emissions and progress toward meeting our targets. This report will include:
 - Total emissions data for Scope 1, Scope 2, and Scope 3.
 - A breakdown of emissions by department, facility, and activity.
 - Progress toward carbon reduction targets, including energy use, waste management, and fleet emissions.
 - Detailed information on the effectiveness of carbon-saving initiatives such as energy-efficient technologies, renewable energy installations, and low-carbon transportation.
- The sustainability report will be publicly available on our website and shared with key stakeholders, including employees, Service Users, suppliers, and regulatory bodies.

2. Annual Emissions Reduction Progress Updates: We will provide progress updates to the Board of Directors and senior leadership on a quarterly basis, including a detailed annual summary that tracks progress against our interim and long-term carbon reduction targets.

This will help to ensure ongoing accountability and facilitate adjustments to the strategy as needed to ensure that we remain on track to meet our net-zero target by 2050.

Compliance with PPN 06/21 for Reporting in Tendering Processes: In addition to regulatory and internal reporting, Available Healthcare Limited will adhere to the Public Procurement Note (PPN) 06/21, which requires public sector organizations and

suppliers to demonstrate their commitment to carbon neutrality through detailed carbon reduction plans.

1. **Carbon Reduction Plans in Procurement:** As part of our compliance with PPN 06/21, Available Healthcare Limited will include our Carbon Reduction Plan in all relevant procurement tenders. This plan will outline our carbon reduction initiatives, progress, and emissions reduction targets, providing evidence of our commitment to sustainability and environmental stewardship.

We will ensure that suppliers and contractors we work with are also committed to reducing their carbon footprint, requiring them to submit their own carbon reduction plans as part of our procurement process. This will help create a more sustainable supply chain, driving carbon reductions across the entire value chain.

2. **PPN 06/21 Reporting and Accountability:** Available Healthcare Limited will submit an annual update on our carbon reduction progress to relevant procurement bodies as part of our reporting requirements under PPN 06/21. This ensures that we are meeting the standards for carbon reduction set forth by the UK government and demonstrating our commitment to reducing emissions within the public sector.
3. **Public and Stakeholder Transparency:** All emissions reductions, goals, and progress will be reported transparently in public-facing documents, ensuring that our stakeholders including Service Users, staff, local communities, and government bodies are informed of our sustainability initiatives. By providing this level of transparency, we foster trust and ensure that Available Healthcare Limited is held accountable for its carbon reduction commitments.

7.0 CARBON OFFSET AND COMPENSATION

7.1 Carbon Offset Projects

As part of Available Healthcare Limited' comprehensive carbon reduction strategy, we recognize that it may not always be possible to eliminate all emissions through internal reductions alone. Therefore, we are committed to offsetting residual emissions that cannot be reduced through internal efforts, ensuring that we can still achieve our overall Net Zero by 2050 goal. Offsetting involves investing in projects that remove or reduce carbon dioxide (CO₂) from the atmosphere, counteracting the emissions that remain after our direct reduction efforts.

Carbon Offset Plans for Residual Emissions:

1. **Identifying Residual Emissions:** Residual emissions are those emissions that remain after implementing all feasible internal carbon reduction strategies, including energy efficiency improvements, renewable energy adoption, low-carbon technologies, and sustainable procurement. These emissions typically arise from areas such as:
 - Long-distance travel (e.g., business flights, employee commuting).
 - Supply chain emissions that are not feasible to reduce immediately.
 - Emissions from hard-to-decarbonize sectors, such as some aspects of medical equipment and healthcare services that still rely on high-energy-consuming processes.
2. **Carbon Offset Strategy:** Available Healthcare Limited will offset the remaining emissions by investing in high-quality carbon offset projects. These projects will be

selected to meet our environmental goals and align with both our sustainability values and national regulations. The primary focus will be on projects that offer long-term, verifiable benefits for the environment, and that help to mitigate the effects of climate change.

Types of Carbon Offset Projects:

1. Reforestation and Afforestation:

- Forest Restoration Projects: We will support reforestation and afforestation projects aimed at restoring degraded forests or planting new forests in areas that can sequester large amounts of carbon. These projects are essential for long-term carbon capture, as trees absorb CO₂ from the atmosphere as they grow.
- Collaboration with Natural England: Available Healthcare Limited will collaborate with Natural England, an environmental body dedicated to protecting and enhancing England's natural landscapes. Natural England works with organizations to restore habitats and increase biodiversity while contributing to carbon sequestration efforts.
- Biodiversity Gains: In addition to carbon offsetting, these projects will also provide biodiversity benefits by creating new wildlife habitats and improving ecosystem services, such as water regulation and soil health.

2. Renewable Energy Projects:

- Clean Energy Investments: Available Healthcare Limited will contribute to renewable energy projects such as wind farms, solar power installations, and hydroelectric plants. These projects displace the need for fossil fuel-based energy generation, thus reducing global CO₂ emissions.
- Global Clean Energy Projects: By funding renewable energy installations in developing regions, we can help to bring cleaner energy solutions to places that may not otherwise have access to them, significantly reducing emissions from fossil fuels in these areas.

3. Methane Capture and Landfill Gas Projects:

- Landfill Gas-to-Energy Projects: Methane, a potent greenhouse gas, is often released from landfills. However, technologies exist that can capture methane from these sites and convert it into energy. We will invest in landfill gas-to-energy projects that capture methane emissions and use them to generate electricity, effectively reducing the impact of waste disposal on the environment.
- Agricultural Methane Reduction: We may also explore partnerships with agricultural projects focused on reducing methane emissions from livestock farming, which is a significant contributor to global emissions.

4. Soil Carbon Sequestration:

- Sustainable Land Management Projects: These projects focus on improving soil health and implementing practices that enhance the ability of soils to absorb and store carbon. Projects may include regenerative farming practices such as no-till farming, agroforestry, and crop rotation, which increase soil carbon storage and improve the sustainability of agricultural practices.

- Partnership with the Carbon Trust: The Carbon Trust is a leading organization in supporting the transition to a low-carbon economy. We will explore opportunities to work with the Carbon Trust on projects that promote sustainable land management practices that also focus on carbon sequestration.

5. Water Conservation and Wetland Restoration:

- Wetland Carbon Sequestration: Wetlands, including marshes and peat bogs, play a vital role in absorbing and storing carbon. Available Healthcare Limited will contribute to projects that restore or protect wetland areas, which have been shown to sequester large amounts of carbon while also providing benefits for biodiversity, water quality, and flood control.

7.2 Offset Verification

To ensure the credibility and effectiveness of our carbon offset projects, Available Healthcare Limited will rigorously verify that the carbon offsets we invest in meet internationally recognized standards and are aligned with UK regulations. This is critical to ensuring that the offsets we purchase genuinely contribute to reducing global greenhouse gas emissions and are not merely hypothetical or ineffective claims.

Ensuring Credible Offset Projects:

1. Third-Party Certification:

- We will only invest in carbon offset projects that are certified by reputable, third-party organizations. This ensures that the projects are legitimate, effective, and meet internationally recognized standards. Some of the most widely accepted certification standards include:
 - Verified Carbon Standard (VCS): The VCS is one of the world's most widely used standards for certifying carbon offset projects. Projects certified under this standard undergo rigorous validation and verification to ensure they meet stringent environmental criteria.
 - Gold Standard: Established by the WWF and other international environmental NGOs, the Gold Standard certifies projects that contribute to sustainable development and meet high standards for environmental integrity and social impact.
 - Clean Development Mechanism (CDM): This is an offset certification under the Kyoto Protocol, which allows for investment in emission-reducing projects in developing countries. The CDM ensures that carbon credits are issued only for projects that reduce emissions beyond what would have occurred in a business-as-usual scenario.

2. Compliance with Environmental Agency (EA) Standards:

- The Environmental Agency (EA) in the UK oversees environmental standards, ensuring that all carbon offset projects meet rigorous environmental and ethical standards. Available Healthcare Limited will ensure that the offset projects we invest in adhere to the EA's guidelines for carbon offsetting, ensuring they are verifiable, transparent, and lead to genuine emissions reductions.
- The EA's standards for carbon offsetting require that the projects are additional (i.e., they would not have happened without the funding), measurable (i.e., the

carbon reduction can be quantified), and permanent (i.e., the carbon is stored for a long-term period).

3. Reporting and Transparency:

- We will require annual verification reports from third-party auditors for every offset project we invest in. These reports will provide evidence that the projects are delivering the promised carbon reductions and will include detailed assessments of the project's effectiveness and progress toward meeting the required goals.
- Transparency: Available Healthcare Limited will make these verification reports publicly available as part of our sustainability and carbon reduction reporting. This will allow stakeholders, regulatory bodies, and the public to see how we are meeting our carbon neutrality goals and ensure that our carbon offset purchases are legitimate and effective.

4. Offset Project Audits:

- To ensure that projects continue to deliver emissions reductions over time, Available Healthcare Limited will conduct periodic audits of offset projects. These audits will be carried out by independent third-party auditors to confirm that the projects remain operational and are continuing to deliver the expected carbon savings.

8.0 FINANCIAL INVESTMENT AND FUNDING

8.1 Budget and Funding for Carbon Reduction

To effectively implement the Carbon Reduction Plan (CRP) and ensure its long-term success, Available Healthcare Limited will allocate a clear and dedicated budget to support the implementation of carbon reduction initiatives. These funds will be essential in driving the transformation of our operations, reducing emissions, and achieving our net-zero emissions target by 2050.

Allocating the Carbon Reduction Budget:

The overall carbon reduction budget will cover a wide range of initiatives, from upgrading facilities and technologies to investing in sustainable energy solutions. This budget will be reviewed and updated regularly to reflect any changes in the scope of the CRP, new technological advancements, and evolving regulatory requirements.

Key Areas of Investment:

1. **Energy Efficiency Measures:** A significant portion of the budget will be allocated to improving energy efficiency across our facilities and operations. These investments will include:
 - Upgrading lighting to LED systems: This is a low-cost, high-impact initiative that significantly reduces energy consumption.
 - Energy-efficient HVAC systems: Replacing older HVAC systems with more energy-efficient models that can be controlled through smart thermostats to minimize energy use.

- Insulation and Building Improvements: Investing in insulation, double-glazed windows, and energy-efficient building materials to reduce heating and cooling needs.
 - Smart Energy Management Systems: Implementing software that monitors and optimizes energy usage across our facilities in real-time, identifying opportunities for savings and efficiencies.
2. **Renewable Energy Investments:** A portion of the carbon reduction budget will go toward installing renewable energy systems, including solar panels and possibly wind energy installations on-site, where feasible. This investment will help us meet our goal of sourcing 50% renewable energy by Year 5 and 100% renewable energy by Year 10.
 3. **Low-Carbon Technologies:** Available Healthcare Limited will invest in low-carbon technologies to reduce emissions from transportation and operations. These investments will include:
 - Electric Vehicle Fleets: Transitioning a portion of our vehicle fleet to electric or hybrid models, which will reduce emissions associated with employee travel, Service User transport, and service-related logistics.
 - Energy-Efficient Medical Equipment: Purchasing energy-efficient medical devices and systems that consume less power while maintaining high-quality Service User care standards.
 4. **Sustainable Waste Management and Procurement:** The budget will also support waste management initiatives that reduce waste sent to landfills, enhance recycling rates, and support the circular economy. Similarly, sustainable procurement practices will ensure that products purchased by Service User are energy-efficient, durable, and responsibly sourced, which will require some upfront investment but will yield long-term cost savings.

Capital vs. Operational Expenditure:

- Capital Expenditure (CapEx): Significant upfront investments will be required for infrastructure upgrades, such as installing renewable energy systems and replacing HVAC units. These will be treated as capital expenditures and amortized over their useful lives.

- Sustainable Procurement Policy: Our procurement policy will prioritize suppliers that have demonstrated strong carbon management practices, ensuring that goods and services we purchase are in line with the carbon reduction goals outlined in PPN 06/21.
- Annual Carbon Reduction Reporting: In line with PPN 06/21 requirements, Available Healthcare Limited will annually report on our carbon emissions reductions and progress toward net-zero, ensuring that we meet the criteria for public sector contracts.

11.5 BEIS Guidance for Energy Efficiency and Emissions Reduction

The Department for Business, Energy & Industrial Strategy (BEIS) provides guidelines for energy efficiency, carbon reduction, and emissions management. These guidelines include specific measures for energy efficiency, carbon reporting, and reducing emissions in both public and private sectors.
